REFLECTIONS

"Calling them like ${\cal D}$ see them"

In my sermon a few weeks ago, I shared a funny story about how someone recently had a one-word first impression of me that I thought was wildly inaccurate. If you were to sum me up in one word, what would it be? That person said, "handsome," which I found hilarious. Genuinely. I played it up and made a big joke out of it during the sermon and the sermon moved on. "How would you be summed up?" is the question the sermon was concerned with.

I had several people respond to the sermon that day by pulling me aside and letting me know that they do see me as handsome. I even got a lovely handwritten card in the mail from someone who watched the sermon and wanted to encourage me about it. It's all incredibly kind of you. And I want you to know that I hear you. Perhaps I really *am* handsome...

... for a preacher. You can sum up George Clooney with handsome. I'm handsome for someone who reads the Bible for a living, has two kids, and makes pizza every Friday. Context! I'm handsome... for a preacher.

That's a consolation clause on the end of that compliment. Ever had one of those? Your doctor says, "you're in great shape... for your age." You're playing ball and someone says, "nice shot... for a beginner." Absolutely withering. That consolation clause on the end does provide some context, though!

I wouldn't write an article about this if it didn't have a point, so let's get to it. God loves you. That's it. There's no consolation clause on the end of it. I don't mean "God loves you... for a sinner" or "...for a screw-up" or "...for a hot mess." God loves you and there's no further context needed in order for that to make sense.

Cards on the table. I have a hard time accepting compliments without trying to deflect or qualify or diminish. But let's all put our cards on the table and admit that maybe we have a hard time that God really truly loves us because we see all the stuff on our insides and we can't imagine we seem all that lovable. God may tolerate me, or accept me, or maybe even like some parts of me. But can God really love me without a qualifier or some consolation clause at the back end?

Yeah. God loves you. That's it.

I'll make a deal with you, OK? I'll try to do better about accepting a compliment every now and then (don't do it all the time or I'll puke), if you can live with what comes next. Just let the period stand at the end of the next sentence and sit with it.

God loves you.

Before Kis Presence with Singing

"Thy wings shall my petition bear to Him"

If you know what hymn that line is taken from, consider yourself a hymn nerd, The hymn is, "Sweet

Hour of Prayer."

Do you pay attention to how a hymn is addressed? To whom or what does it refer? Hymns often have the singer/reader addressing God. Sometimes, they address the sinner. Sometimes, the Holy Spirit is the one to whom we sing. In this case, this hymn *about* prayer is addressed *to* prayer. Interesting. If you look really carefully, you'll even notice that, at least in the case of our hymnal, that the "thys are not capitalized. It's because in this unusual circumstance, they don't refer to God as "thy" often does. They refer to prayer.

Prayer calls to us. When life is challenging us, prayer is there calling us to come for comfort, for consolation, for help. It bids us come to the throne

and express need, want, concern, desire.

The hymn refers to Mount Pisgah. It is from Mt. Pisgah that Moses was given, by God, a glimpse of the Promised Land. The land promised to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. It was to be the Home of the nation of Israel. From Mt. Pisgah, Moses could see God's promise. Prayer calls us to the place from which we can see God's promise. From this perch, we can see our home, and set off on life's journey.

Prayer is also a resting place. A place of refuge and safety. Prayer can be a familiar place, where we

are glad to return for comfort and solace.

The hymn writer, William W. Walford, was blind, but oh how clearly he saw! Those around him, in the mid 1800s, knew him to be a brilliant memorizer of scripture, and knew him to be a brilliant preacher of clarity and precision. His grasp of biblical concept is easily evident here in his hymn.

Sweet hour of prayer! sweet hour of prayer! that calls me from a world of care, and bids me at my Father's throne make all my wants and wishes known. In seasons of distress and grief, my soul has often found relief, and oft escaped the tempter's snare by thy return, sweet hour of prayer!

Sweet hour of prayer! Sweet hour of prayer! Thy wings shall my petition bear to Him whose truth and faithfulness engage the waiting soul to bless; And since He bids me seek His face, Believe His word and trust His grace, I'll cast on Him my every care, and wait for thee, sweet Hour of prayer

Sweet hour of prayer! Sweet hour of prayer! May I thy consolation share,
Till from Mount Pisgah's lofty height,
I view my home and take my flight.
This robe of flesh I'll drop and rise
to seize the everlasting prize;
and shout while passing through the air,
"Farewell, farewell, sweet hour of prayer!"
